We will show in this writing the differences in the covenants with God and the allegorical comparison of the marriage covenant between a man and a woman

Now, some state that Jesus/God 'married another' only after He was dead.

There are a few problems with this, and I'll start by saying that we state that the marriage covenant is only an allegorical comparison to the covenants with our God and are quite different in their details.

Thirdly, we can expect that when He deems fit, that God will try to set the godly example by following His own rules. He is not bound to the rules that He puts into place for man, but many times He does tend to act in such a way as to be in line with what He has declared is just and holy.

Fourthly. Jesus has offered an exception whereby harlotry is not committed when we divorce and marry another. Under the law a fornicating wife would have recieved the death penalty, showing the severity of this breach of covenant and thereby ending it the law of the husband with her death.

Now, we know that Jesus did not seem to want to the adulteress brought to Him to be stoned/put to death, so we assume that this is the case under this covenant...that no longer are we to stone an adulteress.

This is perfectly aligned with Jesus exception because He shows there in not condemning divorce/remarriage as 'adultery' where this punishable offense has occurred, that the covenant still has been breached and thus may be ended while still showing mercy to the adulteress herself.

All in all the details harmonize perfectly from over both covenants...just as we might expect from our perfect, infallible Lord and King....

How this information ties into our views
